LITERATURE REVIEW

Bandura's (1977) social learning theory also supports the use of interactive methods, as it emphasizes learning through observation, imitation, and social interaction. In the context of moral education, students develop ethical behavior by engaging with others and reflecting on their experiences.

Research shows that interactive teaching methods significantly improve student engagement and motivation. Hattie (2009) found that active learning strategies have a strong positive impact on student achievement. Laurillard (2012) also highlights the importance of dialogue-based teaching in fostering deeper understanding.

At the same time, educational organizations such as UNESCO (2022) stress the importance of developing not only academic skills but also moral and social competencies. However, some researchers (Selwyn, 2016) argue that the effectiveness of interactive methods depends on proper implementation and teacher preparedness.

METHODS

This study adopts a mixed-methods research design to investigate the effectiveness of interactive teaching methods in spiritual and moral education.

The research involved 120 secondary school students and 15 teachers from three educational institutions. Participants were selected using purposive sampling to ensure diversity in learning abilities and teaching experience.

In terms of moral development, students exposed to interactive methods showed greater ability to analyze ethical situations, express their opinions, and justify their decisions. Observations indicated that activities such as debates and role-playing encouraged deeper reflection and empathy.

Teachers reported that interactive methods made lessons more dynamic and effective, although challenges such as time constraints and classroom management were noted.
